THE GOLF COURSE AT BLACK ROCK COUNTRYCLUB



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Situated in Hingham, Massachusetts, just 17 miles from downtown Boston, Black Rock Country Club is home to one of New England's premier private golf courses.

Developed on the site of a former granite quarry to exist in harmony with its natural surroundings, the course was designed by Brian Silva, Golf World's 1999 Golf Course Architect of the Year.

Numerous granite outcroppings, a thick backdrop of mature oak and pine trees and two large retention ponds contribute to a golfing experience that is strategically challenging, visually stunning and truly enjoyable.

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PRELUDE



A straightforward elevated tee shot on this opening par-4 hole takes you down into the links land. Reaching the green requires a steady uphill climb to a narrow green guarded by a rock outcropping on the right and a large bunker on the left.


MOSS ROCK



This par-3 demands a solid mid-iron tee shot. Best to avoid the pot-bunker front-right of the green. A slippery putt waits from above the hole.

shot into the next county on this tree and rock lined par-4. The elevated, postage-stamp sized green will never fail to present a challenge. Architect Brian Silva provides a bailout left, but left Mother Nature to do the talking short and right.

Try not to hit your tee



COUNTY LINE



GREEN MONSTER



PLATEAU



Don't let the fairway bunkers or overhanging trees intimidate you on this classical uphill par-4. Hit at least one or maybe two extra clubs to reach the flagstick on your second shot, but missing this turtle's back green can be costly.

PEPE'S HOLE



Black Rock's longest hole, a challenging par-5 that requires strategic planning not to mention three solidly struck shots as you wind your way through the old quarry. Failure to stay on the straight and narrow will leave you one very long third shot.


Majestic eastern white pines frame your tee shot on this scenic par-4. An old quarry wall and imposing strip bunker protect the inside of this dogleg left. Choosing the safer route (or slicing) down the right side will add precious yards as the short iron second shot plays into a daunting little well bunkered Seth Reynor rectangular green.

Precision outweighs length on this the second of successive mid-length dogleg left par-4's. From a narrow tee shot and rock framed landing area, an accurate downhill second shot is necessary as trouble lurks if you miss this devilish green.



BARRENS





SEA WALL



The outward nine finishes with a par-3 bordered by water and a strip bunker down the left side and an imposing bunker protecting the right side of the green. The long narrow green subtly slopes away. Beware of the back left Sunday pin placement.

Any thoughts of an easy back nine are quickly dashed on this well-bunkered par-4. Playing dead into the prevailing SW wind, the downhill second shot to this three-tiered green with water on the left is the first of many gut checks on inward nine.

WESTWARD HO!




The inward nine begins with an uphill tee shot to a plateau fairway on this par-4. A jagged rock wall amphitheatre appears to be hard against the back of this sneaky tough green, but be careful to avoid the bunker long and the hazard right. Wow! Once you catch your breath after climbing up among the stately rocks, a courageous shot is demanded on this coolest of par-3's. A rectangular green awaits those who safely negotiate the quarry pond on the left and gaping bunker on the right.

DEVIL'S BACK



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NARROWS



Do you feel lucky? Don't pay any attention to the rock wall on the right or the stand of pines on the left side of this reachable downhill par-4. Let it rip on a straight line and you will be rewarded with a short pitch into our smallest green.

OLD WARD




Use your head on this tempting par-5. After teeing off over water, the second shot demands some planning to set up the best angle into this perched and well-bunkered green. At all costs, avoid the dreaded 50-yard bunker shot.


Better make a committed swing into this par-3. A deep, but narrow elevated green allows little margin for error. A menacing bunker protects the green's left flank and a hazard wraps all around this sneaky tough green.

You will always play this par-4 with your heart in your throat. A towering rock wall frames the entire right side and an intimidating quarry pond guards the left and front of the green. Silva recreated a Redan slope short and right of the green to help feed your 200+ yard second shot onto the bowl-like putting surface.




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CROSS RIP



Don't be fooled by the wide landing area on this wind swept, well-bunkered par-4. A strategically placed pot bunker splits the 70-yard wide fairway. The courageous tee shot down the right side challenging the hazard is rewarded with a friendly angle into a relatively small green. The safer route down the left side leaves a more demanding angle for your second shot over water and sand and into shallow green.



Coming home with the sun and prevailing breeze at your back, swing away on this demanding dogleg right par-4 finishing hole. The player that challenges the daunting set of bunkers guarding the inside of the dogleg will have the preferred angle into the green. The clubhouse and your friends watching from the terrace will serve as the backdrop for your approach shot to a long narrow green guarded by a deep bunker on the left and a hazard on the right.

Built in grand style with its walls clad in native stone and natural cedar shingles, the 42,000 square foot Clubhouse is the centerpiece of Black Rock Country Club.

With high-beamed ceilings and expansive picture windows revealing spectacular views of our golf course, you and your guests will find Black Rock Country Club to be the ultimate retreat for your golfing event, corporate retreat, wedding or private occasion.



DIRECTIONS

Black Rock Country Club is located 17 miles south of Boston just minutes off Route 3.

FROM THE NORTH:

- Take Route 3 South toward Plymouth / Cape Cod
- Take Exit #15 (Derby Street / South Hingham / South Weymouth)
- Bear right at the fork in the ramp
- Merge right onto Derby Street
- Turn left at the 2nd light onto Cushing Street
- Follow Cushing Street for 1.5 Miles
- Turn left onto Ward Street at the blinking light
- Black Rock Country Club is 1/2 mile ahead on your left

FROM THE SOUTH:

- Take Route 3 North toward Braintree / Boston
- Take Exit # 15 (Derby Street / South Hingham / South Weymouth)
- Bear left at the fork in the ramp
- Turn left onto Derby Street
- Turn left at the 2nd light onto Cushing Street
- Follow Cushing Street for 1.5 Miles
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
